Headliners Club's New President JoLynn Free

Not every club in town is headed by a new president as multidisciplinary as JoLynn Free. Who would expect a prominent financial consultant with Stephens, Inc., to have Bachelor's and Master's degrees in Theatre from the University of Texas, and to have played a significant role in a number of Austin's non-profits? Actually, JoLynn is not so much multidisciplinary as multi-talented. Her community involvement encompasses chairing the boards of numerous organizations and foundations including the Austin Community Foundation, SafePlace Foundation, Seton Cove, the Foundation for Religious Studies at the University of Texas, and the Quin Foundation and Church Corporation of the Episcopal Diocese of Texas. She currently serves on several of these boards and the Seton Fund, St. Stephen's Episcopal School, and the Director's Council of the U T Department of Theatre and Dance, and as an Advisory Board member of Conspirare and the Nature Conservancy.

She might even be clairvoyant. Her first job out of graduate school was as Supervisor of Cultural Arts of the City of Austin. In 1976, she was "on the ground" spearheading the first July 4 Austin Symphony Orchestra concert and fireworks event on then Town Lake. How many members were at the club, looking down on the festivities, while JoLynn's thoughts were on whether the cannon would fire on cue during the 1812 Overture finale? She laughed relating this, saying she remembered raising the princely sum of \$5000 from the then Capital National Bank to support the whole event.

JoLynn is married to architectural preservationist Gregory Free. They have a daughter and grandson in Homer, Alaska, (population 6,000 on a warm day). Daughter Shay is an RN; fourteen-year-old Avram, a cellist in the community orchestra, rock climber, and player on an adult soccer team. He also spends his spring break each year skiing with his grandmother.

JoLynn loves bringing family, friends, and clients to

the club, especially those new to Austin, and showing them the beautiful environment from the 21st floor's unique vantage point. She feels that the holidays are the best times to use Headliners because the decorations are exquisite and lend a festive atmosphere for entertaining. Particularly memorable to her is a Christmas party for clients about two years ago, at which Craig Hella Johnson of Conspirare performed with guest artist Rob Albers. "It was an intimate, magical evening none of us will forget," JoLynn says.

Her favorite entrée on the menu? she replied that she and Gregg love "all the fish. And when I'm being really bad, I have the veal." The couple greatly enjoy the quiet elegant atmosphere while dining at the Headliners.

Fielding the question about her first reaction when asked to be president, she said that, luckily, Elizabeth Christian "warned" her that her position as the Executive Committee Secretary, usually leads to the presidency. Her first thought was, "Oh, no!" but she quickly realized that the well-run Board makes her job easy. "My job is to do no harm and don't mess with Sue." (The two women are long-time friends, so this was said with affection.)

Others are confident that JoLynn will be more than just an "attender". Chairman of the Board, Brian Greig, said, "For several years, JoLynn has been of special help on the Investments Committee, bringing another experienced mind to gauge the work of our financial advisors. As president, her calm and thoughtful approach will benefit us all." And former Board Chairman, Tom Granger, was equally complimentary of JoLynn's upcoming year as president. "She's a get-it-done person. When she is given a job, she will do it very effectively and efficiently." It looks like another great year at Headliners, with a leader who knows Austin, loves to work, and can get things done.

Randa Safady

Randa Safady is a familiar face at Headliners, both for her volunteer service to the Club and the time she spends there – either attending its varied programs or conducting business.

“I’m there at a minimum of one day a week and more often than not at least two days a week. It’s sort of an extension of my office for all practical purposes,” says Safady, chief advancement officer for the University of Texas System, located across the street. “I have to take about 50 steps and I’m right there.”

But it’s not just the proximity that has made Safady such a Headliners devotee that she’s back on the Board of Trustees barely a year after wrapping up service to the Headliners Foundation Board of Governors. Safady last served on the Club’s Board of Trustees in 2007.

“To me, the Headliners Club is sort of Ground Zero for all civic and business gatherings in Austin,” she says. “It’s a place I find to be inspirational and fun and provides a great comfort zone for business and civic discussion.”

Safady – who’s considered a national expert on philanthropy -- has developed innovative programs for the UT

System and its campuses, including creating and serving as executive producer of a statewide PBS series on higher education, “State of Tomorrow,” that has earned five Lone Star Emmy awards.

Additionally, she volunteers for universities and nonprofit organizations and has been honored by her alma mater Texas State University as well as receiving St. Edward’s University’s Presidential Medallion and UT College of Communication’s Robert Jeffrey Award for Distinguished Service.

Safady says she “remembers very distinctly” her first Headliners visit, courtesy of the late Frank McBee, where a 20th floor room honors his Austin legacy. She was working at St. Edward’s University, where McBee helped

students with leadership. The campus earned a large grant and Safady says McBee brought her to the Headliners “on a Friday for a celebratory lunch”

Shes’ been returning ever since.

Headliners Foundation Names New Executive Director: Araminta Sellers

Araminta Sellers was appointed executive director of the Headliners Foundation in January 2016 after 20 years of experience working in state government and private sector communications roles.

Sellers most recently served nearly three years as Deputy Executive Director and Director of Administration at the Railroad Commission of Texas. Previously she was Chief of Staff for State Rep. Paul Workman, Director of Policy and Planning at the Texas Legislative Council, and held several other positions working for members of the legislature, including the late Lt. Governor Bob Bullock.

She holds an M.S. in Organizational Leadership and Ethics, from St. Edward's University, and a B.S. in Public Relations from UT Austin. She and her husband, Tom Sellers, are members of the Club.

Sellers will administer the Foundation's programs that support excellence in Texas journalism. These include professional awards, college scholarships, grants for edu-

cational initiatives, and events that put a spotlight on the state's outstanding journalism and the best reporters and editors.



"Araminta assumes this key leadership position at an exciting time," said Mark Morrison, Foundation chair. "We recently celebrated the Foundation's 30th anniversary and its record of remarkable growth and increasing impact. Araminta is the ideal leader to build on our successful record as we establish ambitious goals for our fourth decade and beyond."

Araminta succeeds Janice Cartwright, who resigned after serving as executive director for two years. Morrison noted that Cartwright improved communication with Texas media and journalism educators, expanded scholarship applications, modernized databases, and helped launch the Showcase Awards. "We thank Janice for these and many other accomplishments and wish her well in her future pursuits," said Morrison.

Foundation Launches 2016 Awards, Scholarships

The Foundation's Professional Excellence Committee has accepted 38 submissions for the 2015 Showcase Award for Enterprise and Innovation. Each is posted and available for viewing at headlinersfoundation.org under the Journalism Awards tab.

The Showcase Awards were established in 2013 to recognize outstanding journalism that makes a significant impact on government, public policy or the conduct of a business, non-profit or other organization. All professional Texas-based news providers – print, broadcast and digital – are eligible for this award, with \$5000 in total prize money. "Visitors to our site can view some extraordinary journalism that media throughout Texas produced in 2015," said John Lumpkin, committee chair.

The Foundation's Academic Excellence committee, headed by KVUE President Patti Smith, is currently reviewing scholarship applications from students pursuing journalism in Texas for the 2016-17 academic year. Last year the Foundation received a record 63 scholarship applications and awarded \$56,000 to students attending 19 Texas universities.

Winners of both the Foundation's professional awards and scholarships will be honored at the annual Mike Quinn Awards Luncheon, to be held September 17 at Headliners Club.

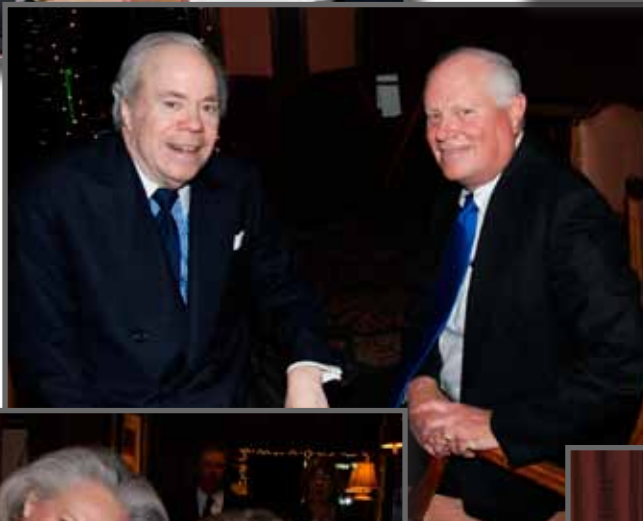

Inside Track: Luncheon With Dr. Richard Garriott de Cayeux

February 11, 2016

Dr. Richard Garriott de Cayeux, wealthy Austin entrepreneur, friend of Elon Musk, and one-time space tourist came to the Headliners to explain his proposal for a Personal Rapid Transit (PRT) system for the City of Austin. It consists of individual battery-operated cars carrying up to six people that are fully automated, on-demand, non-stop and travel on an elevated guideway point-to-point. They are convenient, green and a tenth the cost of any competing transit

system, according to Dr. Garriott de Cayeux. The cars load and accelerate to 35 mph in 90 seconds at the push of a button.

The only PRT to be built in the United States was a prototype built in the 1970's subsidized by the federal government in Morgantown, West Virginia, to connect the campuses of West Virginia University. It ran on an electrified

track, had massive cost overruns, and was widely deemed at the time to be a white elephant. Yet, it is still in use today and was revamped in 2014. Since then, there have been technological improvements that have made PRTs cheaper to both install and run. Garriott cites the ULTra (Urban Light Transit) PRT opening at Heathrow airport in May of 2011 as his model. It shuttles people from Terminal 5 to various parking facilities.

Although he would like to involve all of Austin long-term, for the moment Garriott Enterprises, in partnership with the Ben Barnes Group, is proposing a PRT to the University of Texas with 7 miles of track

encompassing the 40 acres with 170 cars and 20 stops with two or three nose-in parking spots at each stop. It is to be privately financed at a cost of approximately \$120 million and should be completed in 18-20 months. The goal is to eventually move cars to the periphery of campus, freeing up valuable real estate now taken up by parking garages. When finished, UT would be the first in the nation to have such a system.

In conjunction with the Greater Austin Crime Commission the Headliners Club hosted Admiral Bob Inman and Chairman Michael McCaul for a discussion of Failures of Imagination, McCaul's book.

As the representative of Texas' 10th Congressional District and Chairman of the Homeland Security Committee, McCaul is uniquely qualified to pen a look at the possible threats to our national security as well as actions needed to protect us. Admiral Inman served as Director of the National Security Agency and Deputy Director of Central Intelligence. The insightful duo is no stranger to the Headliners Club. The packed house spoke to the

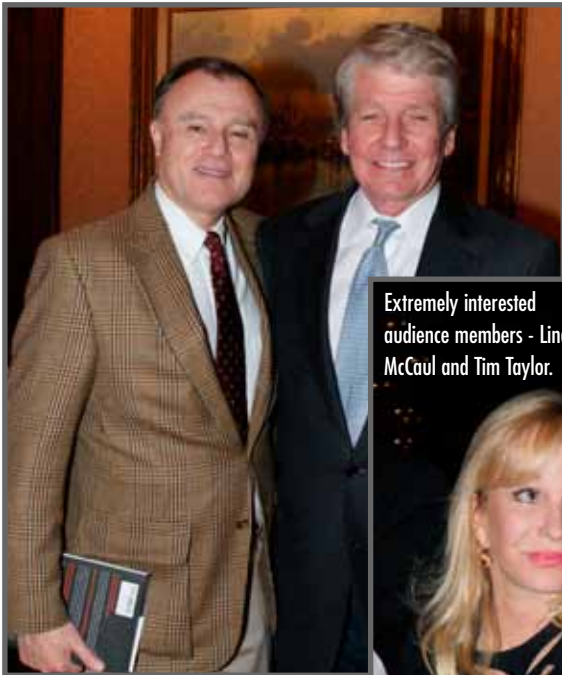
audience's confidence in them.

In general the assessment of the current threats to the United States was sobering. A disaffected employee, a terrorist hacker, any country with state-owned businesses may be the instigator of physical or cyber attacks.

Admiral Inman noted a Paris-like shooting could easily happen in the United States. The sophisticated encryption techniques used by those terrorists allowed them to converse in "dark space," where traditional technology solutions are ineffective, allowing their communications to remain unseen. Chairman McCaul concluded "If we cannot see it we cannot stop it." The controversy concerning privacy versus national safety loomed large in the discussion. The new generation of terrorists have gone viral with about 200,000 tweets per day, advised Chairman McCaul. Admiral Inman said "they know we are listening but we have less access to the information so we are at greater risk now than a year ago."

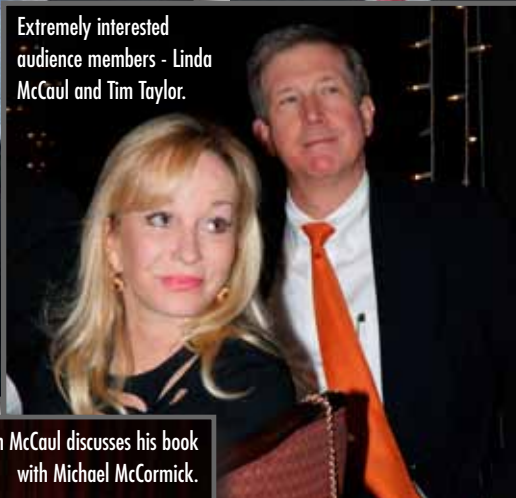

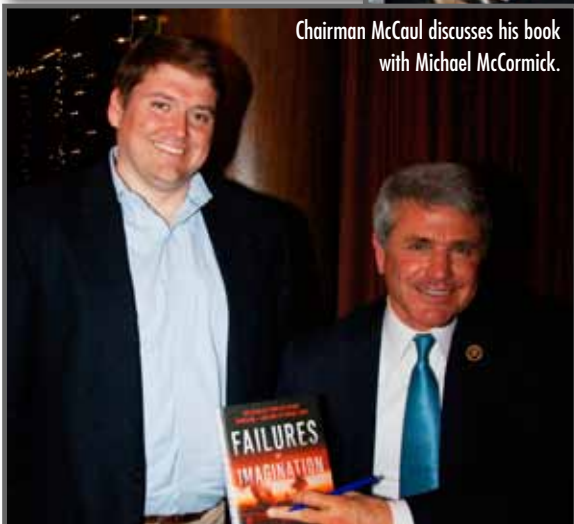

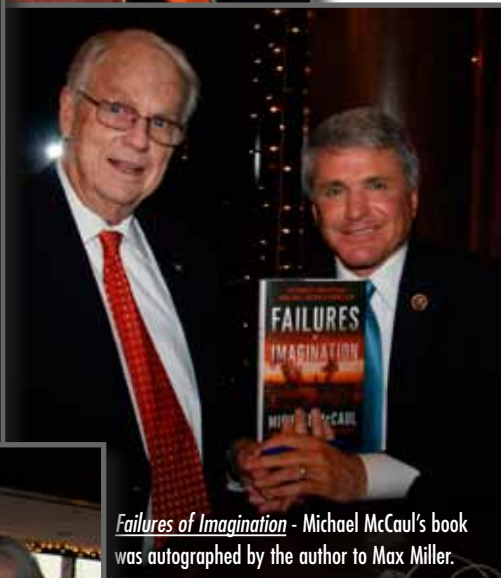

Looking forward Admiral Inman advised the United States to remember China is a competitor, not an ally and that care must be taken not to make it an enemy. And Russia? Mr. Putin clearly does not like us and has concluded at present he can push us around. In this arena long term planning is advised as Admiral Inman predicted Putin would be around until at least 2024. Chairman McCaul advised extreme caution in dealing with the "tiger" that is Iran.

Challenges to our national security abound. Questions from the attendees included the relationship between Israel and the United States, missiles in outer space and what to look for in the United States. A read of Chairman McCaul's book addresses many of the "what ifs." In our rush to be connected, concludes Admiral Inman, "the world has amplified the problem of disaffected individuals."

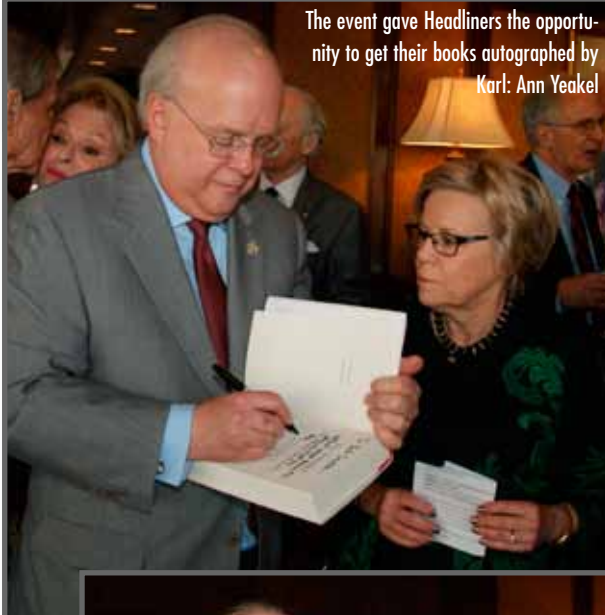

Headliners members and guests listened with rapt attention as fellow member Karl Rove, weekly op-ed writer for the *Wall Street Journal* and Fox News contributor, vividly recounted the story of the presidential election of 1896. Present day has nothing on the past!

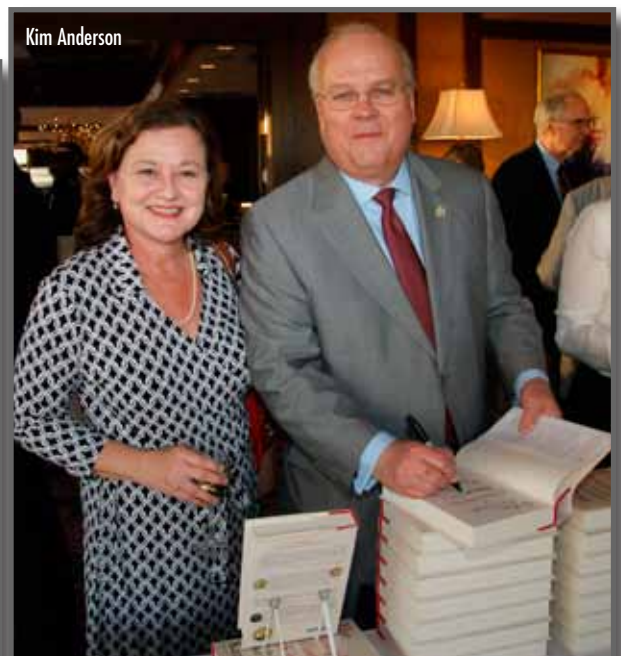
In his latest book, *The Triumph of William McKinley*, Rove recounts the populist movement that led the democrats to nominate orator William Jennings Bryan and the Republican, William McKinley of Ohio. Consider the backdrop of this election. The times were rife with technological change – automobiles, refrigerated rail cars, electric lights. The differences between the men were numerous. The most cited one is the belief in the free coinage of silver (Bryan) versus the imperative to remain on the gold standard (McKinley). Does the Cross of Gold Speech, Bryan's famous impassioned plea at the Democratic National Convention, ring a bell?

"Having behind us the commercial interests and the laboring interests and all the toiling masses, we shall answer their demands for a gold standard by saying to them, you shall not press down upon the brow of labor this crown of thorns. You shall not crucify mankind upon a cross of gold."

The drama of this election year was not confined to the national level. For example, Rove described the riotous scene at the Millet Opera House (now the Austin Club) when chaos erupted at the Texas

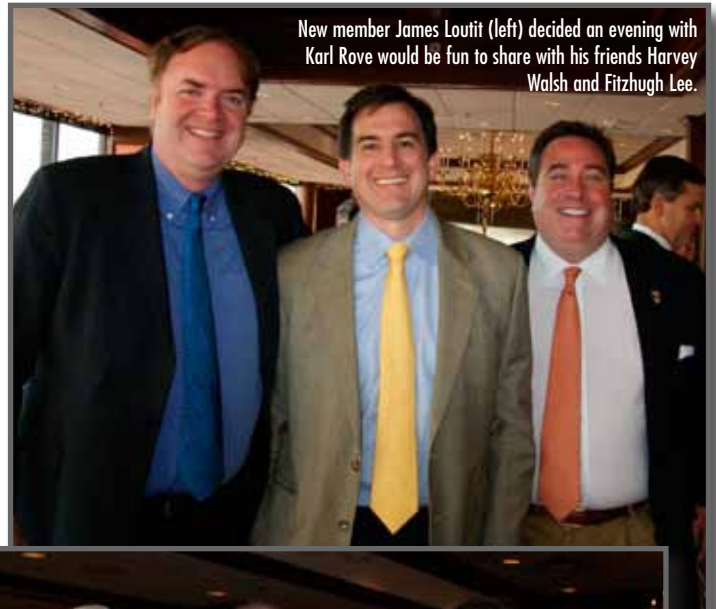

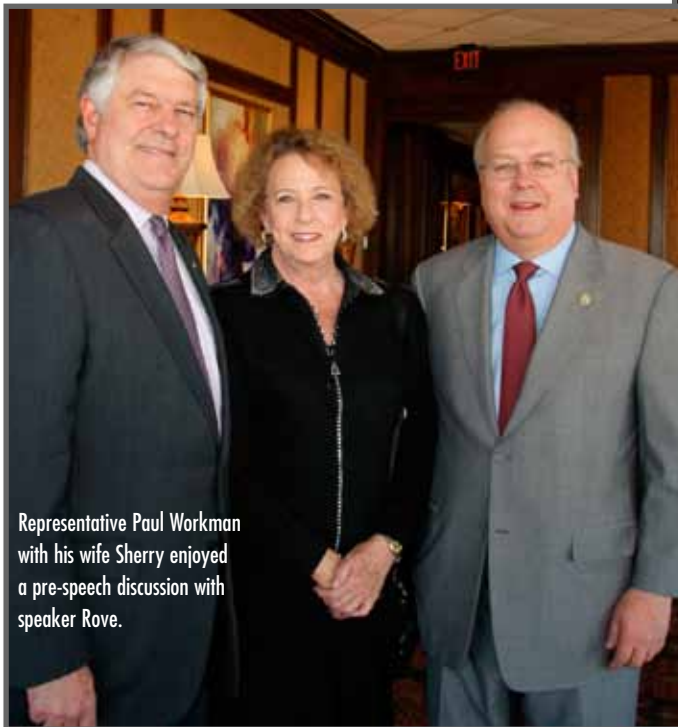

Republican Convention: “Chairs and other tables were smashed over heads or against bodies. Fists, bludgeons, bottles, knives and razors appeared.” Not exactly the storied political picture of a smoked-filled room and a brokered convention.

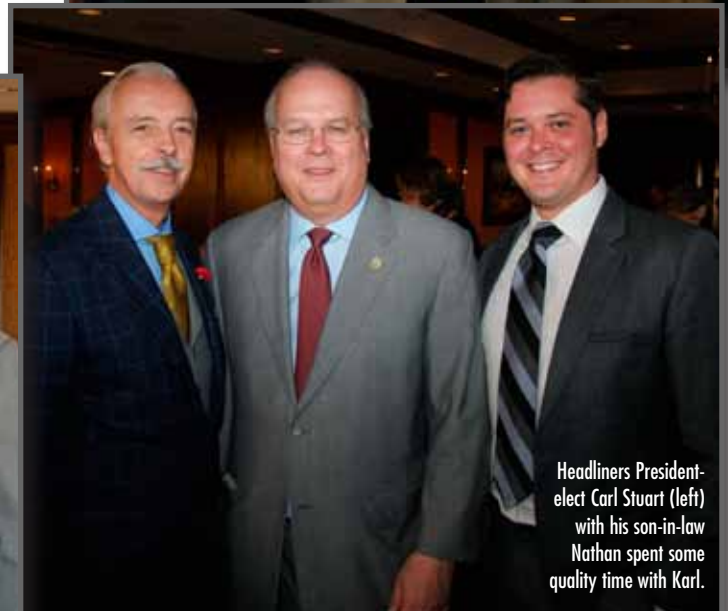
Having served valiantly in the Civil War, in the United States Congress and as governor of Ohio, McKinley ran a presidential race unlike any other. The 25th president is credited with running the first modern primary campaign. He focused on individual segments of voters such as Catholics and ran openly for office, contrary to the tradition of waiting at home for the race to run its course. His election and campaign reformed and modernized the Republican Party, creating a governing majority that dominated American politics for the next three plus decades.

As to an overall prediction and what might be ahead in November? “We are entering into the twilight zone.”

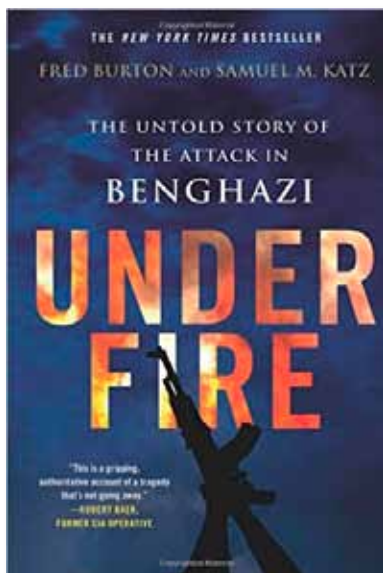
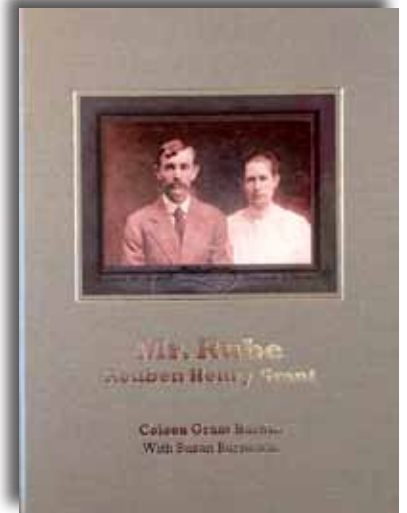


Failures of Imagination: The Deadliest Threats to Our Homeland—and How to Thwart Them - by Chairman Michael McCaul

More than just the minute-by-minute narrative of a desperate last stand in the midst of an anarchic rebellion, *Under Fire* is an inspiring testament to the bravery and selflessness of the men and women who put their country first while serving in one of the most dangerous regions in the world.

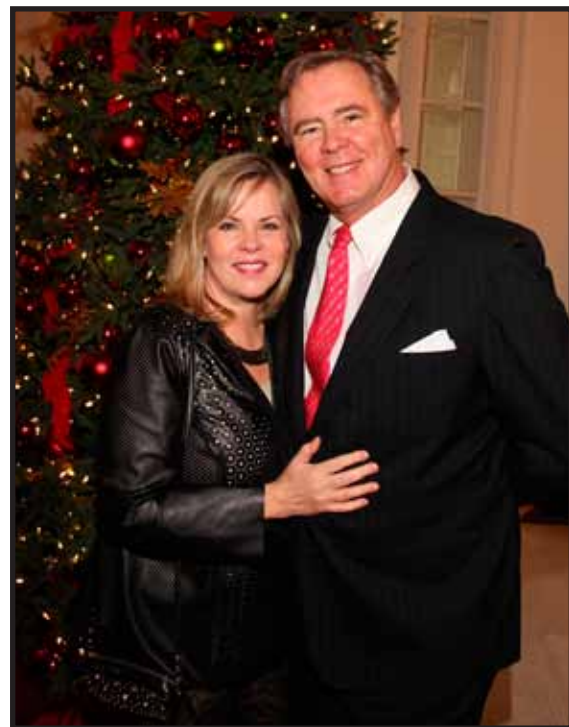
